This major encourages students to become involved in ethnographic research and fieldwork while gaining a firm theoretical foundation in anthropology. Undergraduates are able to take a number of courses that focus on aspects of anthropology and are encouraged to include visual media in their senior field methods practicum.

BACHELOR OF ARTS (BA) GENERAL OVERVIEW

ACADEMIC OPPORTUNITIES

Ethnographics Lab: The Ethnographics Laboratory is a part of the Center for Visual Anthropology which provides archival and computer facilities for students and faculty who work with nonlinear editing systems and interactive media in anthropology.

Study Abroad: Spend part of your summer in Guatemala studying the past and present cultural identity of the Mayan people of Central America through USC Dornsife's Problems Without Passports program, or travel to Ireland and Northern Ireland to examine the politics of language revitalization through the Anthropology Department's Maymester program. Students may also choose to spend a semester abroad in a program that correlates with research plans and the overseas Anthropology classroom experience.

Supplemental Instruction: This academic support program provides regularly scheduled, peer-led study sessions for common Biology, Chemistry, Math, and Physics courses.
