

Graduate Student Government Executive Board Proposal for the Provost's Diversity and Inclusion Council

As the Graduate Student Government (GSG) Executive Board, we propose the following new goal for the Provost's Diversity and Inclusion Council: to investigate and subsequently address the history of race and racism, white supremacy, civil rights violations, and contributions to society at the University of Southern California. When the task force was initially created in 2015, it was created with hopes of strengthening USC's "bold commitment to diversity and inclusion" and to "re-commit to awareness and action." In the last couple of years the task force has worked with nineteen different units to provide multiple rounds of feedback on twenty three diversity plans, an ambitious task that was completed in Spring of 2018. At this juncture it seems appropriate to reimagine future directions for this working group. The proposed new focus for the task force, grappling with and addressing the history of USC, is an integral part of the task force's original goal to foster a more inclusive and diverse campus environment.

We believe that it is of the utmost importance for USC to convene a task force to address historical issues of race and inequality because our community and, moreover, our nation must face our shared histories of discrimination in order to move forward towards a more equitable future.

USC has had a complex and often fraught relationship with race and racism.² We hope to use the task force to address many aspects of this history by conducting historical research about USC, exploring opportunities for reparations, and recommending steps to further share history and reconcile with USC's history.

Several of USC's elite peer institutions, such as Harvard, Georgetown, and Yale, have released reports addressing historical connections to enslavement and contemporary issues of race and inequality (see: Appendix I). As such, we propose that USC follow the general model pioneered by other institutions, which includes a university sanctioned task force that researches and reports on complex histories of race and civil rights violations, and then proposes steps towards reconciliation.

Additionally, many of our peer institutions, such as Duke, Georgetown, and Yale, have made the decision to remove statues and monuments from their campuses, along with renaming buildings and residence halls that have a connection to histories of racism and white supremacy in the United States (see: Appendix II).

We hope that USC will not only follow the lead of our peer institutions, but also that of the City of Los Angeles and the State of California. On Tuesday, August 7th, 2018 the LA County Board of Supervisors

officially apologized to the women who were forcefully sterilized at LA County USC Medical Center in the 1960s and 70s.³ The Board of Supervisors also expressed their support for California Senate Bill 1190 Eugenics Sterilization Compensation Program.⁴

Thus, in order to address the history of race, racism, and civil rights violations, we propose that the Diversity and Inclusion Council do the following:

- 1. Conduct historical research about USC's relationship with race, including USC's involvement with the following:
 - a. Forced sterilization at (USC) LA County Hospital⁵
 - b. USC's role in Japanese internment⁶
 - c. Von KleinSmid's connection to the eugenics movement⁷
 - d. The background of the name Traveler⁸
- 2. Explore opportunities for appropriate changes and reparations, perhaps reconcile the former historical actions by:
 - a. Acknowledging and apologizing to impacted minority populations (for example, the women who were forcefully sterilized at LA County USC Medical Center and those who were sent to internment camps during their college careers) and their descendents by offering various forms of reparations including honorary degrees, financial compensation, and long-term institutional support
 - b. Including Von KleinSmid's eugenics work and unsavory history in the USC website about past presidents, and removing the Von KleinSmid name from any and all university-related structures
 - c. Renaming campus monuments that are connected to USC's fraught relationship with race, and removing or re-labeling their existing plaques
- 3. Recommend action items to further share history and reconcile with USC's history, perhaps:

- a. Creating an official report to be published on the USC website that outlines all of USC's history, including the wrongs that USC has done in the past, and steps USC is taking now to reconcile this history
- b. Erecting new statues and monuments or renaming existing buildings on campus in order to acknowledge and celebrate the diverse and courageous individuals affected by USC's past actions and to better reflect USC's current student population

We believe that the act of reconciliation involves not only an acknowledgement or apology, but also tangible action steps. USC can do more to address its past and further cultivate a campus space that is inclusive and accepting of all. To catch up to our peer institutions, we must take appropriate action and continue to change and grow according to the needs of our diverse students, faculty, and staff.

Thank you for considering our proposal. We hope that the Provost's Diversity and Inclusion Council will accept these tasks and improve our campus for current and future Trojans.
