

 - Learn, develop skills, remain open and follow-up on chance events.



Basic process for finding research opportunities

Research is an amazing way to gain relevant experience that will help you explore your potential career of interest while building experience.

Please use these links as a starting point to start looking for opportunities that will help you explore your interests while gaining hands-on experience.

Once you find an opportunity of interest, tailor a resume and cover letter that explain your interests and skills related to the opportunity. Mentioning coursework and academic projects that have helped you gain experience in you application materials is a great to demonstrate your abilities to support the

If a specific position is not posted, feel free to email the contact person or researcher directly expressing interest in a research position. Share your resume, cover letter, class schedule, as well as the number of hours weekly you may be able to commit to research. While many research opportunities are unpaid, we suggest mentioning if you have been granted federal work study funds. In your email, we also suggest asking what the appropriate next steps might be in the process of securing a research role with them.

The month before each new semester starts is a great time to approach researchers for potential research opportunities. After you reach out, we suggest waiting a full week and then following up. Please be patient in this process- some researchers will be in the field or lab and/or unable to answer emails on a regular basis.

Developing application materials



Developing application materials

Unlike the undergraduate college application process, there is no common application for graduate study (except for professional programs like Law, Medical, Dental, and various Allied Health programs). Candidates apply to each graduate program of interest via an online program/school application.

No two graduate programs and graduate schools are exactly the same! As such, each program will have unique application requirements. Please ensure you fully understand what each program is requiring and follow their directions exactly as requested. If you have questions about their requirements, please contact each program or school's admissions team for clarification.

Please use the following resources as general guidelines while tailoring toward the specific requirements each school/program is looking for.

Entrance exam testing

Letters of recommendation

Resume/curriculum vitae (CV)

Interviews

Many schools do not require interviews. If they say they are optional, treat as required and start stretching your interview muscles just in case!

Some schools interview for scholarships or if they want to further evaluate you as a candidate.

Practice interviews using a tool such as Big Interview (complimentary to USC students and alumni). Log-in and look for the "Practice" tab on the top of the page. Enjoy!




Application fees

Application fees vary by school. Expect to pay anywhere from \$70 – \$140 per application fee. Some schools will offer application fee waivers-review their admissions page for potential fee waiver opportunities.
