
and its representation in printed media. Her research compares how this radical feminist movement in 1970s Japan was represented in mainstream media sources to their self-representation in *minikomi* ("mini-communications"), or pamphlets, fliers, and original publications produced firsthand by *ribu* activists and groups. Ayaka will be applying to law school in the fall and hopes to pursue a career in the intersection of law and the arts!

"Don't be afraid to indulge your curiosity! NEW ASIAN STUDIES COURSES SUMMER 2022

AMST-342: Law and Identities - Race, Empire, Justice

Faculty Instructor: Adrian De Leon

Tuesdays-Thursdays | 2:00PM-4:50PM | Online

In this course, we will ask a deceptively simple question: what is justice? Specifically, what is justice under U.S. national and global regimes of racism and imperial violence? With a focus on the Asia-Pacific region, we will consider how justice, both in and out of American imperial rule,

find its intersections in historical and contemporary politics of racial solidarity, Indigenous sovereignty, and the ongoing legacy of World War II atrocities.

EALC-380: Cultural Topics in East Asian Literature - Japanese Food Media

Faculty Instructor: Miya Elise Desjardins

Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays | 11:00AM-1:50PM | CPA 110

This course examines Japanese food in modern and contemporary literary classics; writings by academics, public scholars, journalists, food writers and activists; and other forms of media such as TV shows, short and feature-length films, and photojournalism and photography. The investigation of the topic of food textually, as a reflection of cultural, social, religious, economic, and political values, will extend into the visual arena, specifically the presentation of Japanese food through *moritsuke* (the art of presenting food, e.g. table settings, ceramics) and interior design (e.g. restaurant design, tea house architecture).

ANTH-324gw: Contemporary China - Cultural Politics and Social Realities

Wednesdays and Fridays | 2:00PM-3:20PM | KAP 159

This course explores everyday life, politics, social transformations, and cultural practices in the People's Republic of China, from cultural studies and social science perspectives. We will analyze the transformations that have occurred in rural and urban China, focusing on the years since "Reform and Opening" in the late 1970s and the "rise" of China in the global world order. In particular, we will examine the influences of film and media, domestic and international migration, economic "liberalization," and social memory on the lives of contemporary Chinese citizens through the lenses of gender, ethnicity, imaginaries, and intimacy.
