

# **Special Guest Lecture: Aynne Kokas**

Wednesday, February 15 | 4:00PM-6:00PM | SCA 112 | No RSVP Required Prof. Nitin Govil invites the wider community to an event with Aynne Kokas (Associate Professor of Media Studies at the University of Virginia) on her new book, Trafficking Data: How China is Winning the Battle for Digital Sovereignty (Oxford University Press, 2022). In her book, Kokas looks at how technology firms in the two largest economies in the world, the United States and China, have exploited government policy to gather information on citizens. Drawing on case studies from rapidly growing areas of global media investment like social media apps TikTok, WeChat, and Grindr, and gaming platforms like Fortnite, Trafficking Data explains how China is fast becoming the global leader in internet governance and policy, and thus of the data that defines our public and private lives.



### **Japanese Digital Humanities Project Assistant**

The East Asian Libraries is looking to hire a work-study student with Japanese language experience to work as the Japanese Digital Humanities Project Assistant. The current project is the Japanese translation of *Alice in Wonderland* by Akutagawa Ryūnosuke and Kikuchi Kan. The position requires a High level of proficiency in Japanese language and ability to read *kanji*. The responsibilities include reviewing the text produced with OCR software with the original text. This will be an opportunity to learn about digitizing Japanese language materials and working with older kanji character variants.
