UPCOMING EVENT Modern Japan History Association: Author Seiji Shirane and Discussant Andrew Gordon Wednesday, December 14, 2022 | 4:00PM - 5:30PM | REGISTER

Prof. **Benjamin Uchiyama** invites the wider community to a Modern Japan History Association event with **Seiji Shirane** (Assistant Professor of Japanese History at City College of New York). Prof. Shirane will be speaking about his new book, *Imperial Gateway: Colonial Taiwan and Japan's Expansion in China and Southeast Asia, 1895-1945* (Cornell University Press, 2022). In *Imperial Gateway*, Seiji Shirane explores the political, social, and economic significance of colonial Taiwan in the southern expansion of Japan's empire from 1895 to the end of World War II. Drawing on multilingual archives from six countries, *Imperial Gateway* shows how Japanese officials and Taiwanese subjects transformed Taiwan into a regional gateway for expansion in an ever-shifting international order. **Andrew Gordon** (Lee and Juliet Folger Fund Professor of History, Harvard University) will serve as discussant.

This event is co-sponsored by the Modern Japan History Association and the East Asian Studies Center.

EASC Graduate Fellowships provide summer stipends, typically between \$1,000-\$3,000, depending on the proposed course of study. The purpose of the award is to advance understanding of East Asia and/or US-Asia relations. Awards are given based on the quality of the proposed project and budgets submitted with the application. The award may be used for research, language training or area studies, and can also be used for research including Asia in a comparative context or as a case study. Visit the EASC website for



The CAORC National Endowment for the Humanities Research Fellowship is now accepting applications! This fellowship provides the opportunity for scholars to spend significant time in one country with an Overseas Research Center as a research base.

The fellowship supports advanced research in the humanities for US scholars who hold a PhD (and

also foreign national scholars who have been resident in the US for at least three years). Fellowship stipends are \$5,000 per month for four to six consecutive months.

Fields of study include, but are not limited to, history, philosophy, religious studies, linguistics, languages, literature, literary criticism, and visual and performing arts.
