Revisiting Buddhist Nuns in Contemporary Korean Buddhism

Please join us for a lecture with **Eunsu Cho**, Professor Emeritus of Buddhist Philosophy at Seoul National University. Prof. Cho's talk will explore the Buddhist female monastic community (bhikṣuṇī) and provide a preliminary overview of this lesser-known community of religious women. It will cover aspects of their monastic life beginning with the ordination ceremony, and discuss the current challenges and future tasks of the Korean bhikṣuṇī sangha. This talk hopes to shed more light on the role of women in Contemporary Korean Buddhism and how they continue to shape the history of the tradition.

This event is organized by the Department of East Asian Languages and Cultures and is sponsored by USC's School of Religion, the Shinso Ito Center for Japanese Religions and Culture, the Korean Heritage Library, and the East Asian Studies Center.

Please join us for a screening of the *Ito Sisters:*An American Story. This feature-length documentary film captures the stories of three Japanese American sisters, interviewed in their eighties and nineties, as they recount how their immigrant parents struggled to make a life in the United States at the beginning of the 20th century. The family's chronicle is set against the backdrop of the anti-Japanese movement in



California, a 60-year campaign by politicians, journalists, landowners, labor leaders and others that culminated in the evacuation and incarceration of more than 120,000 Japanese Americans from the West Coast during World War II.

The panel will be moderated by **Velina Hasu Houston**.


