Prof. Saori Katada invites **Prof. Andrew Oros** for a talk on the major demographic transitions that are underway in Asia and the Pacific. The populations of China, Japan, Taiwan, South Korea, and Russia are rapidly aging and shrinking, while India, the Philippines, Vietnam, and Australia, among others, continue to grow. How will these striking changes affect regional security dynamics and the United States–led alliance structure in the Indo-Pacific? Oros considers how technological change is mitigating the drawbacks of aging populations as well as how factors such as autonomous defense systems and artificial intelligence present new challenges.

The position carries a normal teaching load of four courses per academic year (two each semester), spanning introductory, upperdivision, and graduate levels.
