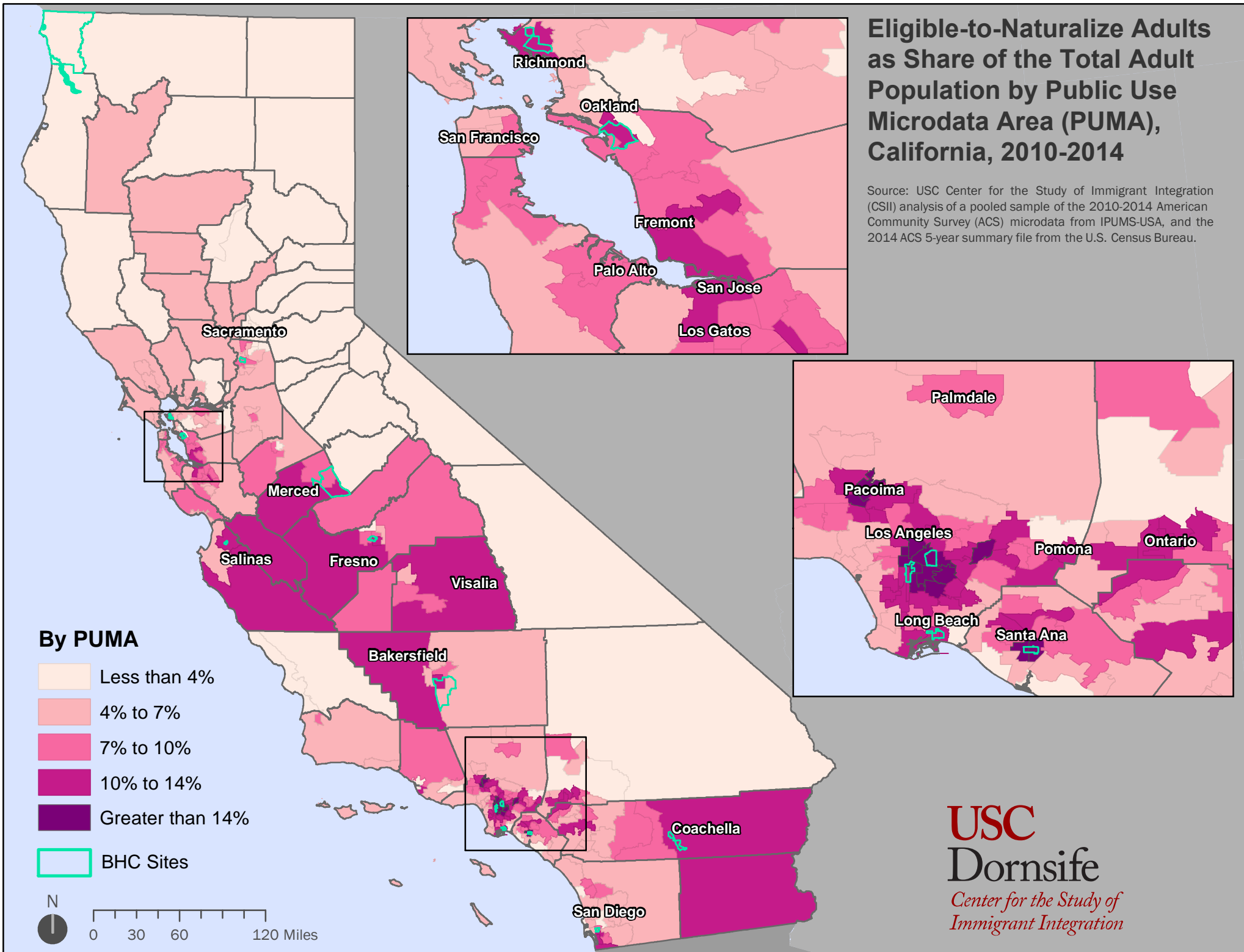


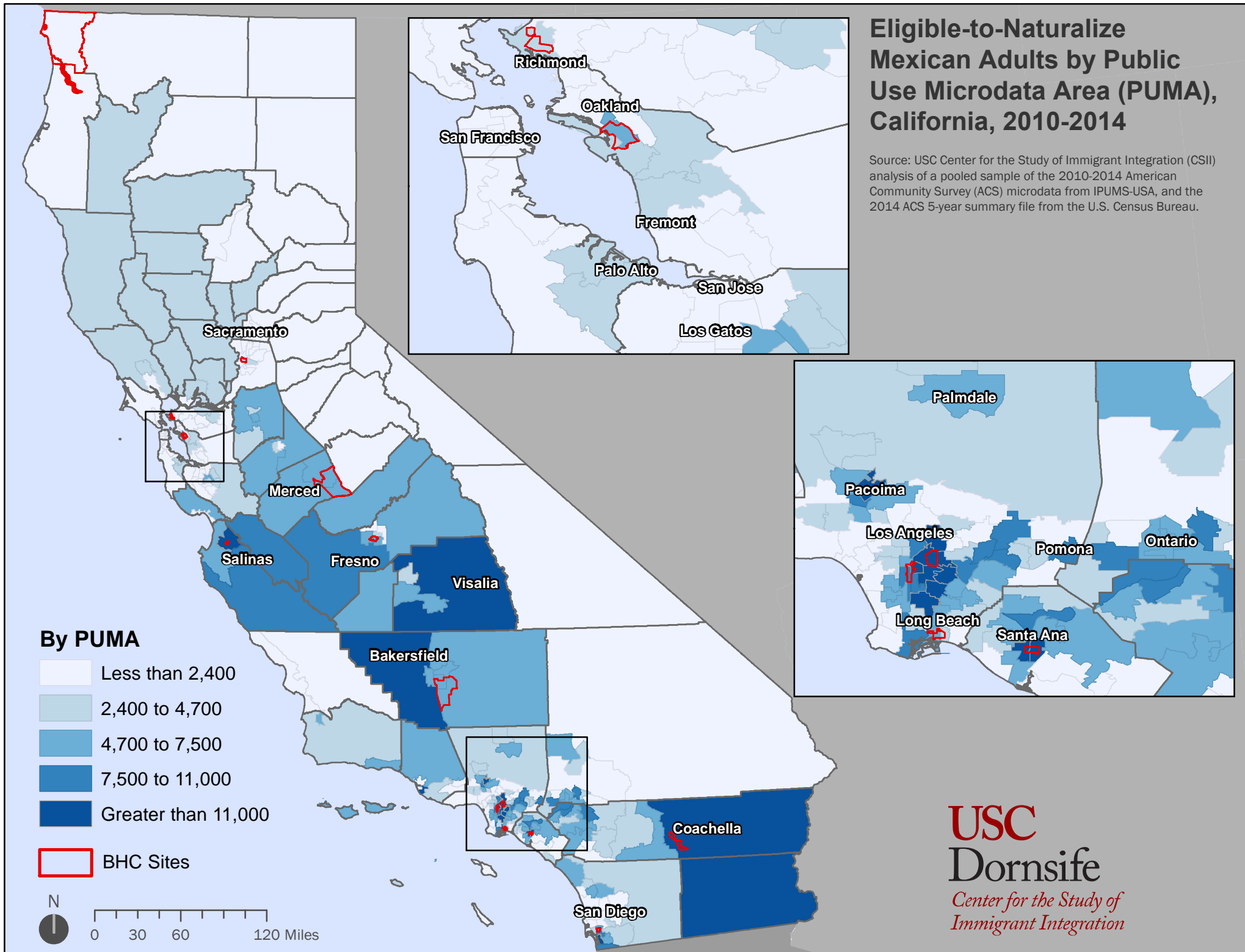
Eligible-to-Naturalize Adults as Share of the Total Adult Population by Public Use Microdata Area (PUMA), California, 2010-2014

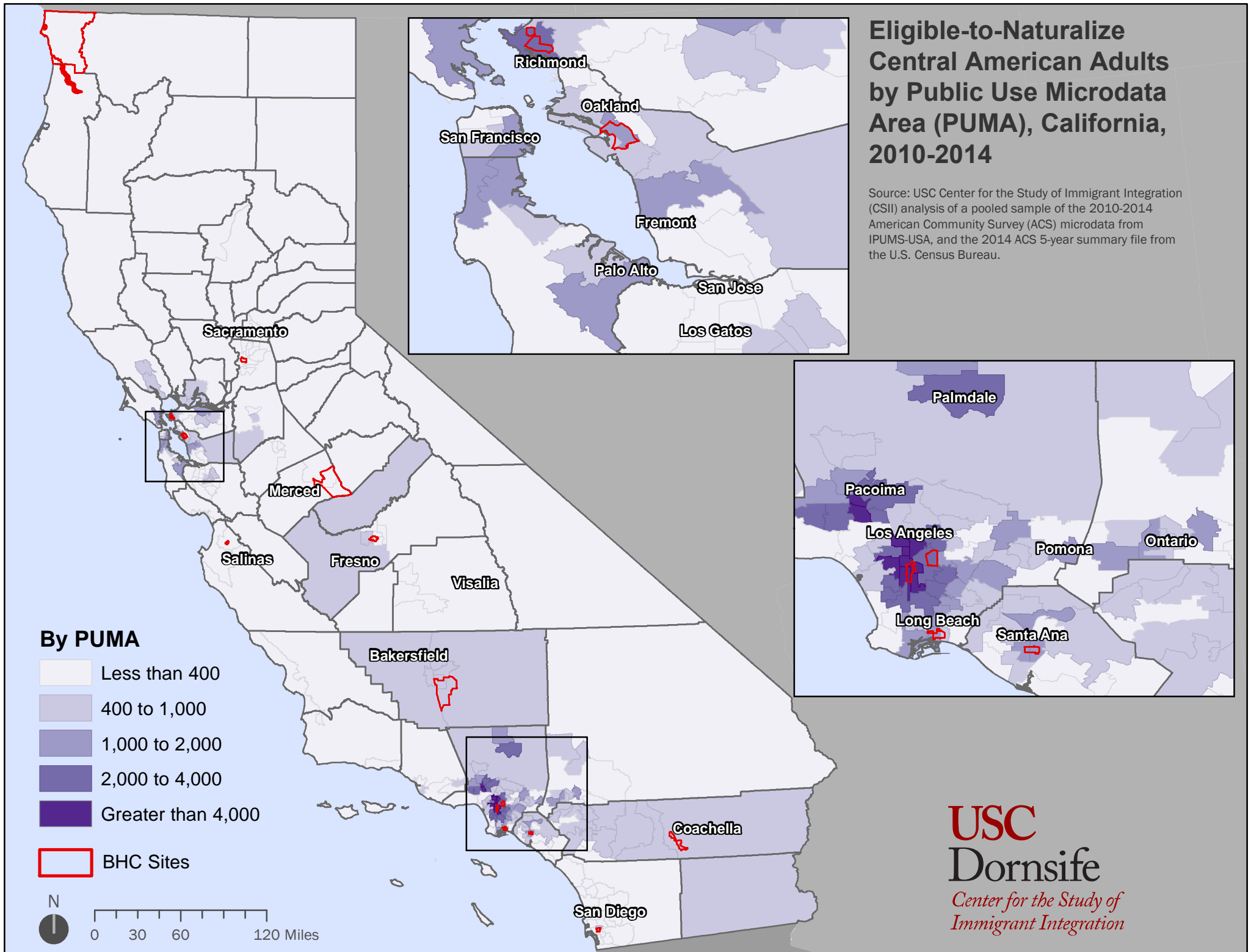
Eligible-to-Naturalize Mexican Adults by Public Use Microdata Area (PUMA), California, 2010-2014
