COURSE DESCRIPTION:

In this course we will explore the major social, political, and economic developments affecting Los Angeles over the last 400 years. While paying close attention to the ways in which L.A's history has been unique, we will also consistently strive to place the city's past into a larger national and a global context. Upon completion of the course, students should be able to speak and write intelligently about major themes, critical moments, significant individuals, and specific social, racial, and ethnic groups in the history of the Los Angeles region.

COURSE ASSIGNMENTS:

Photo Essay (30%): Take a picture. In a 5-page essay, explain the historical significance of the image in the photograph based on what you have studied and read in the course so far. Upload to canvas by February 23.

Reading Essay (30%): Find an article online about Los Angeles. In a 5-page essay, analyze the argument of the piece and respond, given your historical knowledge. Upload to canvas by April 13
