Current Research Topics Under Investigation

The mission of the USC Dornsife Center for Self-Report Science (CSS) is to improve our understanding about how people answer questions about themselves and to develop innovative methods that provide accurate, reliable, and ecologically valid self-reports. We are currently developing a new study involving ecological momentary assessment (EMA), an assessment methodology that involves frequent sampling of participants' experiences throughout the day and in their natural environments. This study will examine whether the act of repeatedly answering the same momentary questions changes participants' experiences or behaviors, a phenomenon called reactivity. The study seeks to enroll approximately 120 participants at the USC site who will participate in an EMA protocol involving physical activity measurement.

Specific Qualifications for Research Assistants

We seek motivated and reliable students with an interest in social and health psychology and self-report measurement. Students who join our team will be involved in a variety of research tasks. These include literature reviews, study material preparation, assisting with recruitment, eligibility screening, in-person and online data collection, participant management, and preparation of basic study reports. Students who join our center will work closely with our project specialists who conduct the study activities. They will also attend weekly team meetings with the full research team at CSS.

Desired Qualifications for Research Assistants

Applicants should have strong interpersonal, communication, and organizational skills, be detail-oriented and reliable, be able to work in a team, and have prior educational experience in psychology or related social sciences. Interested students will need to commit to two semesters of participation in the research (Fall 2025 and Spring 2026), have availability of a minimum of 10 hours per week (if needed in blocks of several hours), need to be able to assist with in-person study visits when needed, and have flexible hours throughout the week to assist the research team in running the study.

Preferred Qualifications for Research Assistants

Preferred qualifications include prior research experience with human subjects, in-person and online data collection, experimental study designs, familiarity with EMA or physical activity measurement, knowledge of basic statistics and statistical software packages, and online data collection tools for research.

The USC Psychology Services Center (PSC) provides low-cost therapy and assessment services to individuals, families, and couples in the community. The Motivation and Education Research Group is a research team in the Rossier School of Education at the University of Southern California (USC). Supervised by Professor Erika A. Patall, the Motivation and Education Research Group (MERG) consists of both graduate students and undergraduate students who conduct primary research studies and syntheses of research on issues of motivation, primarily in educational settings. Topics studied in MERG generally pertain to the environmental and interpersonal precursors to motivation and the relations between motivation and achievement outcomes across the lifespan. Current Research Topics Under Investigation

The CAR lab examines cognitive and affective processes involved in the regulation of negative affect, in an effort to identify vulnerability factors for depression.

We take a multi-method approach to examining individual differences in styles of thinking and regulating negative affect. This work involves laboratory-based measures of brain activity (using fMRI and event-related potentials), autonomic nervous system functioning (heart rate and respiration), and behavior (computer tasks and questionnaires). In addition, to understand behavior outside of the lab, we utilize ambulatory assessment to measure person-centered variability in autonomic functioning (with wearables), sleep quality (with actigraphy), affect and regulation strategies (using ecological momentary assessment), and digital phenotyping approaches to measuring behavior.

Current Research Topics Under Investigation

The mission of the Learning, Development, and Rehabilitation Lab is to advance the science underlying early intervention for infants and children, with a focus on promoting development, participation, and inclusion for children with developmental disabilities. Research in the lab aims to understand early perceptual-motor skills, everyday experiences, and learning processes in infants with typical and atypical motor development, and to develop interventions that promote exploration, learning, and global development in children with neurodevelopmental conditions. We use wearable technology including head-mounted eye trackers and accelerometers to measure infant behavior in natural contexts. Our work is highly interdisciplinary and integrates developmental psychology, movement science, and rehabilitation science. Current projects include characterizing spontaneous locomotor behavior, responses to music, and social interaction in infants with and without Down syndrome; measuring everyday motor experiences in infants' home environments; and examining a novel overground stepping intervention to support walking development in infants with Down syndrome. Current Research Topics Under Investigation

At the Brain, Emotion, and Attention Development (BEAD) Lab, we examine individual differences in social and emotional development. We are interested in why and how individuals differ in how they express and regulate their emotions – often starting from a very young age. We want to understand how characteristics of the child (e.g., temperament) and their environment (e.g., parenting and peers) interact to create the differences we observe in children's social and emotional lives. To do this, we combine several methods including behavioral observations, computer-based tasks (eye tracking), and neuroscience measures (EEG and fMRI).

Current Research Topics Under Investigation

In the CHILD Lab, we investigate how language and cognition interact across the lifespan, from infancy to adulthood. The questions we ask range from how infants use language to learn categories and remember objects to how children and adults use linguistic and world knowledge to infer new word meanings. Our work also explores variability in language development, examining how language abilities vary across different learners (e.g., multilingual children, children who are late talkers) and different contexts (e.g., hearing speech that is less clear or that occurs in an unfamiliar accent).

Current Research Topics Under Investigation

The Biobehavioral Addiction Research Lab (BARLab) studies risk and protective factors for addiction and conducts clinical trials to study new treatments for substance use disorders. The BARLab moved to USC in 2024, and is housed in the USC Institute for Addiction Science and the Department of Population and Public Health Sciences, Keck School of Medicine. A major focus of the lab's recent work has been to conduct clinical trials evaluating GLP-1 receptor agonists (medications like Ozempic/Wegovy and Mounjaro/Zepbound) as a novel class of treatment for addiction. Research Assistants selected for the 2025-2026 year will be involved in one or more clinical trials investigating a GLP-1 agonist for alcohol use disorder or tobacco use disorder/smoking cessation. Specific roles will include patient outreach and recruitment, conducting screenings to determine eligibility, and assisting with patient visits and data collection. The BARLab requires a minimum commitment of one academic year and a minimum commitment of 8 hours per week. Due to the clinical nature of our research, all shifts are in-person at the HSC campus.

Specific Qualifications for Research Assistants

Research Assistants must be willing to interact with participants and assist with outreach/recruitment. A minimum commitment of 8 hours/week for 2 semesters is required, and RAs must be able to attend shifts in person.

AI Tropes and the Human Mind: A Neuroscience Perspective

While the advent of AI, such as Google Gemini and ChatGPT, will undoubtedly result in numerous benefits, it also brings growing concerns. The purpose of this project address a subset of concerns from the perspective of neurobiology in the form of experimental studies and analyses. The goal is to answer the following questions: Do the concerns have any merit? What is the likely origin of the concerns? Assuming the concerns are well founded, what can be done to counter them?

Embodied Semantics and Communication

Most of our metaphors are embodied: we “handle” situations; we “kick-off” a new year; we “chew over” decisions. Using fMRI and behavioral studies we explore how language processing involves sensorimotor brain representations. We investigate both literal and metaphorical language.

Current Research Topics Under Investigation

I research how subtle, situational factors affect our thinking and behavior. My research especially investigates what makes things funny. We have investigated whether authenticity matters in humor appreciation, how funny LLMs are compared to humans, and how small contextual factors that interfere with one's processing (i.e., background noise, poor acoustics, etc) reduce the funniness of jokes by making them seem less coherent. I am currently working on two new projects: how labeling comedy as "improvised" (vs. "pre-written") affects the funniness of jokes and whether jokes about American culture and celebrities translate to other cultures (e.g., India) better than jokes about other cultures translate to Americans. RAs will engage and be mentored in many aspects of the research process. Specific RA roles/responsibilities and training opportunities include literature searches, data analysis, finding and editing comedic stimuli for studies, creating questionnaires in Qualtrics, and scientific presentation and communication.
