

Since the 1969 Stonewall Riots, "gay pride" has been the rallying cry of a broad social movement for sexual freedom as well as the political force behind the emergence of the field of lesbian and gay studies. But has something been lost in the scramble to transform homosexuality from a perversion to a proud social identity? Gay Shame lifts the unofficial ban on

DAVID M. HALPERIN is W. H. Auden Collegiate Professor of the History and Theory of Sexuality at the University of Michigan, where he is also Professor of English, women's studies, comparative literature, and classical studies. A founder of the field of queer studies, Halperin is the author of One Hundred Years of Homosexuality and Other Essays on Greek Love, Saint Foucault: Towards a Gay Hagiography, How to Do the History of Homosexuality, What Do Gay Men Want? An Essay on Sex, Risk, and Subjectivity, He edited The Lesbian and Gay Studies Reader (with Henry Abelove and Michele Barale) and co-founded (with Carolyn Dinshaw) GLQ: A Journal of Lesbian and Gay Studies. With Valerie Traub, he has just published Gay Shame (University o Chicago Press), a book and DVD based on a groundbreaking conference at the University of Michigan
